
## 10 fun facts about St. Mary's Anglican Church, Newboro

Before the church was built, dedicated local Anglicans held services in an upper room at Benjamin Tett's house at 1 Main Street, Newboro.

During 1849 to 1850 St.
Mary's Anglican Church
was built at the present
site: 15 Brock Street.

Built in Gothic Revival style, with a belfry, short spire on a square tower. Inside, look for a unique rostrum pulpit!






The landmark stone was quarried nearby on Little Rideau Lake Road - and hauled to the site by teams of horses.

The church is known for its stunning stained glass windows, one which is believed to feature Tiffany glass.

Pew boxes were made of beautiful local butternut; the church is known for its exceptional woodwork, including a communion rail encircling the altar.





The second floor balcony above the front entrance is a rare feature for churches of this time.

Benjamin Tett purchased the land and paid the wages of the workers who built the church, led by the Stanton Brothers contractors.

When the last shingle was to be nailed to the roof, the carpenter called for John Poole Tett, Benjamin's son, to swing the hammer - ensuring that two generations of Tett Family worked on the church.
